1853 OS Yorkshire. Sheet 174 1:10,560 (6 inches to 1 mile) surveyed 1846-1851, published 1853. https://maps.nls.uk/view/102344815

1891 OS York. 1:2500 (25 inches to 1 mile) surveyed 1889. These plans show virtually every house. Explore York has a laminated set. EY map 4/93 covers an area bordered by Swann Street, City Wall, Slip Inn, Vine Street, St Clements Church and Nunthorpe Road.
